The Football Team won the Yampah Valley League Chamionship with a great many Senior Boys on the main squad.



All the council members attended the Western Slope Conference at Grand Junction in the fall.


At Christmas, two of the members, with Mr. Igo's help, decorated the tree for the holiday season.

On Saturday, April 18, the annual scholastic contest sponsored by Western State College of Gunnison, Colorado was held at the Garfield County High School.



Music was furnished by the High School Glee Club.




RODNEY JONES (Wimpy) 2, 3, 4 Senior Guard

Girls' Gym






