
Gridiron Swing



Vernon Phillips (Mike) 2, 3, 4 Senior Tackle





Three years' participation in physical training is required but few girls of G. C. H. S. graduate with less than four years in this course.



Boys Physical Education






G. C. H. S. Gets in the Swim

In keeping with the war-time policy of teaching swimming to high school students, Glenwood Springs has really "got into the swim" by offering a course, mandatory to Juniors and Seniors, of a series of ten swimming lessons.

The Navy Department represented by Captain Hermann, the Red Cross and Captain Guild have made it possible for the school to inaugurate this up-to-the-minute program with swimming instructions given in the Yampah Pool, which ranks second to none as the biggest naturally heated, mineral water, outdoor pool in the United States.

On April 27, Captain Guild met with the Juniors and Seniors to give them initial instructions before the actual swimming lessons were to begin. May 3 saw actual swimming lessons take place with Mrs. Guild, Miss Teeter, Mrs. Eastlack, Mrs. Small, Mrs. Drake, and John Guild assisting Captain Guild at the pool. Lessons for boys and for girls were given on alternate days.

According to his plans, Captain Guild will require each student to meet certain requirements which include the passing of the Franklin Buoyancy Test, rhythmic breathing, prone float, glide, 100 yards in 2 styles, float, skull, dive and swim through burning oil, and some first aid instructions.














