In the fall of 1942, fifty-two green freshmen entered the portals of G. C. H. S. with high ideals and great ambitions. The first event in their high school career was freshman initiation. The boys donned feminine apparel and the girls dressed as tramps for this gala occasion and performed in an amateur exhibition for the rest of the students. Later in the afternoon the frosh showed their ability was equal to that of the sophomores by tying the score in the Frosh-Soph Struggle.

Freshman enrollment in musical activities was high. The band had nine freshman members, the orchestra four, and the Glee Club had eleven girls enrolled.

During the Christmas season they gave a play, "The Chimes Ring In," sponsored by Miss Pursell.

Class officers chosen for the first year of high school were as follows: sponsor, Wilma Pursell; president, Betty Cowles; vice-president, William Huber; secretary, Pat Weaver; treasurer, Allen Bowles; treasurer for Student Council, Bunn Bigum; class representative, Jimmy Croll.

Having emerged from the freshman to the sophomore year, they proved victorious in the struggle with the new freshman class.

Class officers were sponsor, Miss Pursell; president, Laura Dunsdon; vice-president, Royal Olsen; secretary, Catherine Dawson; treasurer, Peck Leonardi; secretary for Student Council, Bunn Bigum; class representative, Wayne Johnston.

The class of '46 was a group of socially inclined people who staged many parties and dances, one of which was a combination class party and dance held on the evening of November 5

At the end of the term the class journeyed to Marble for the school picnic.

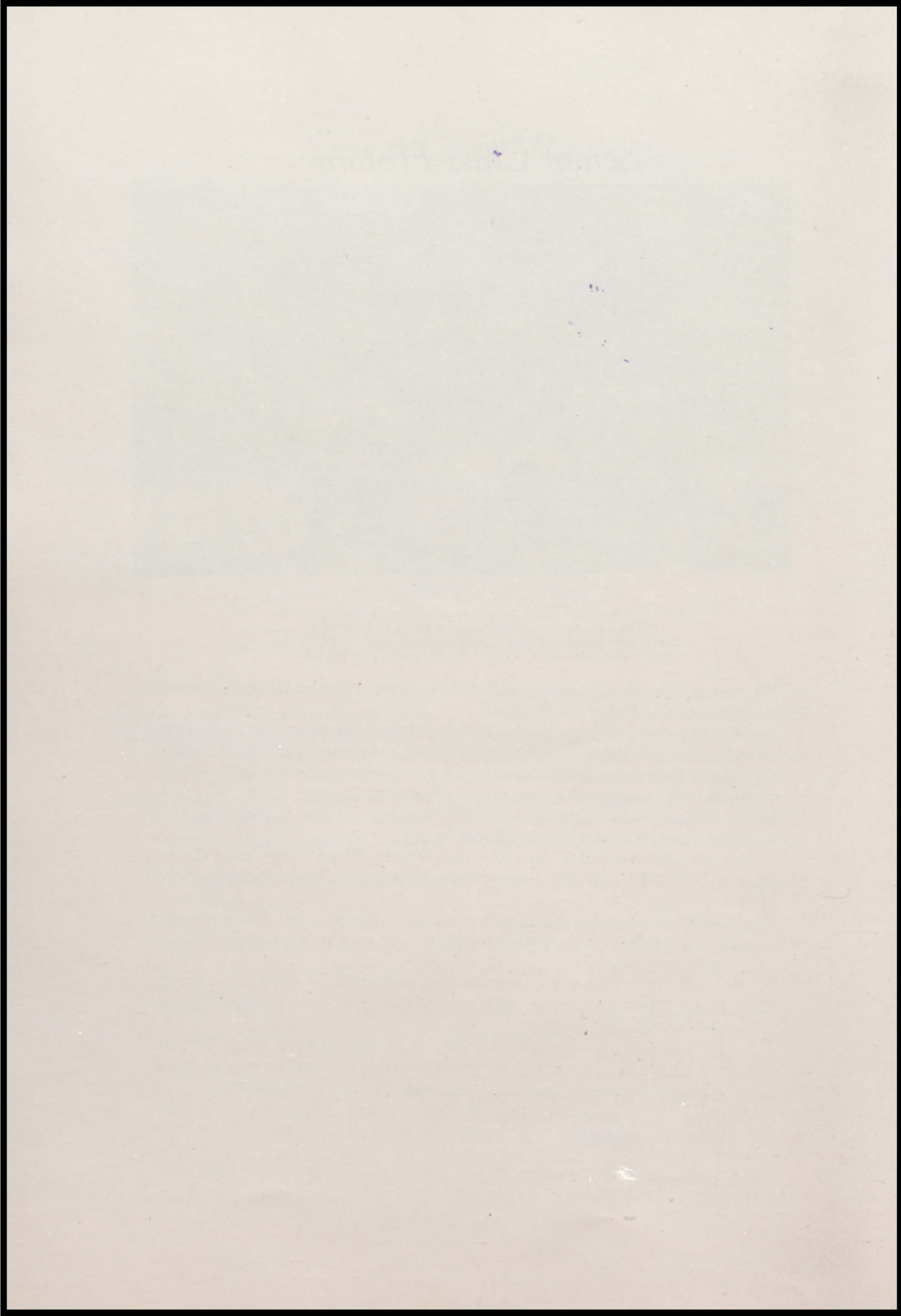
One of the most prominent members of the class, Peck Leonardi, joined Uncle Sam's Navy during this year.

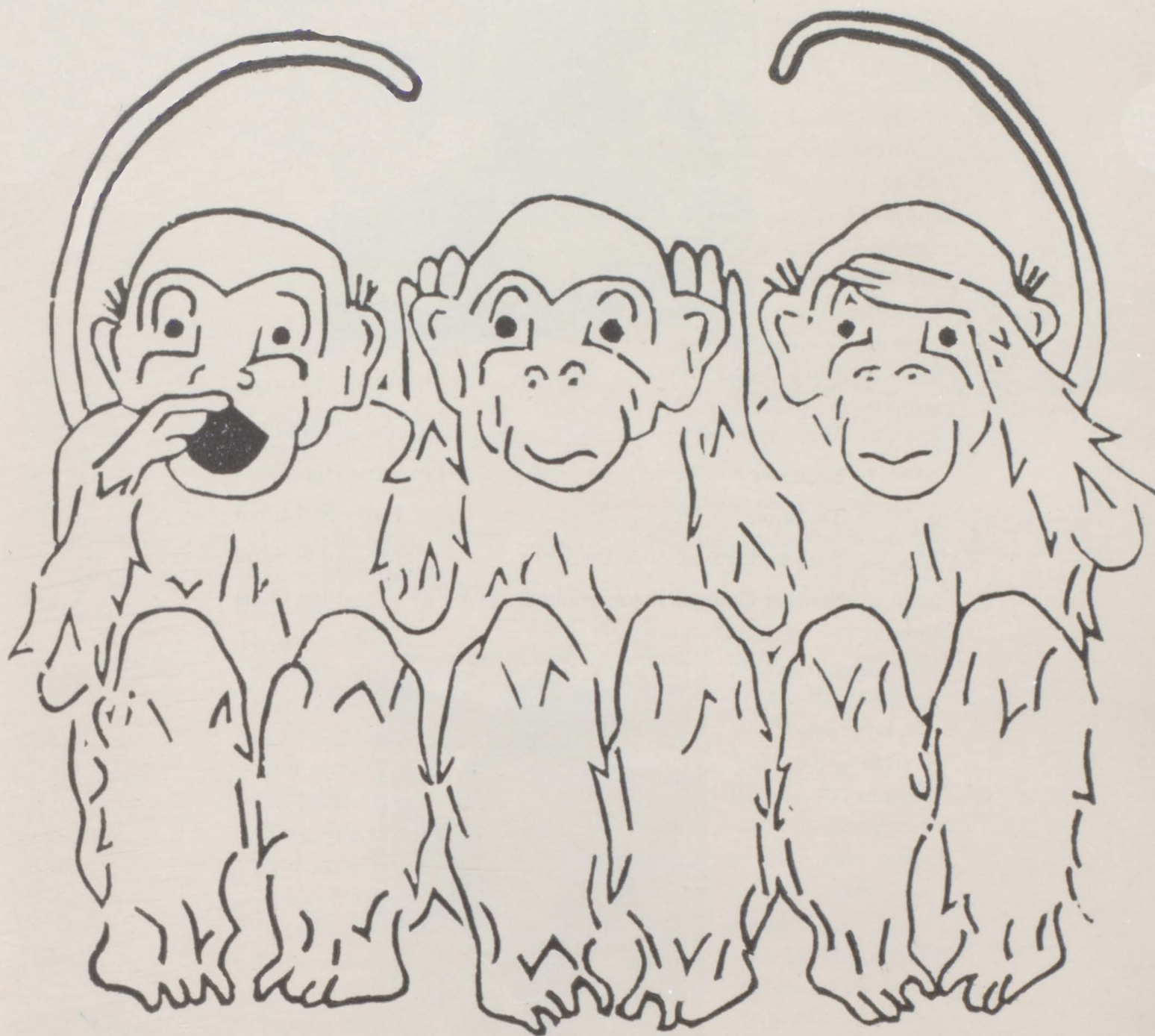
William Huber was elected president of the Student Body.

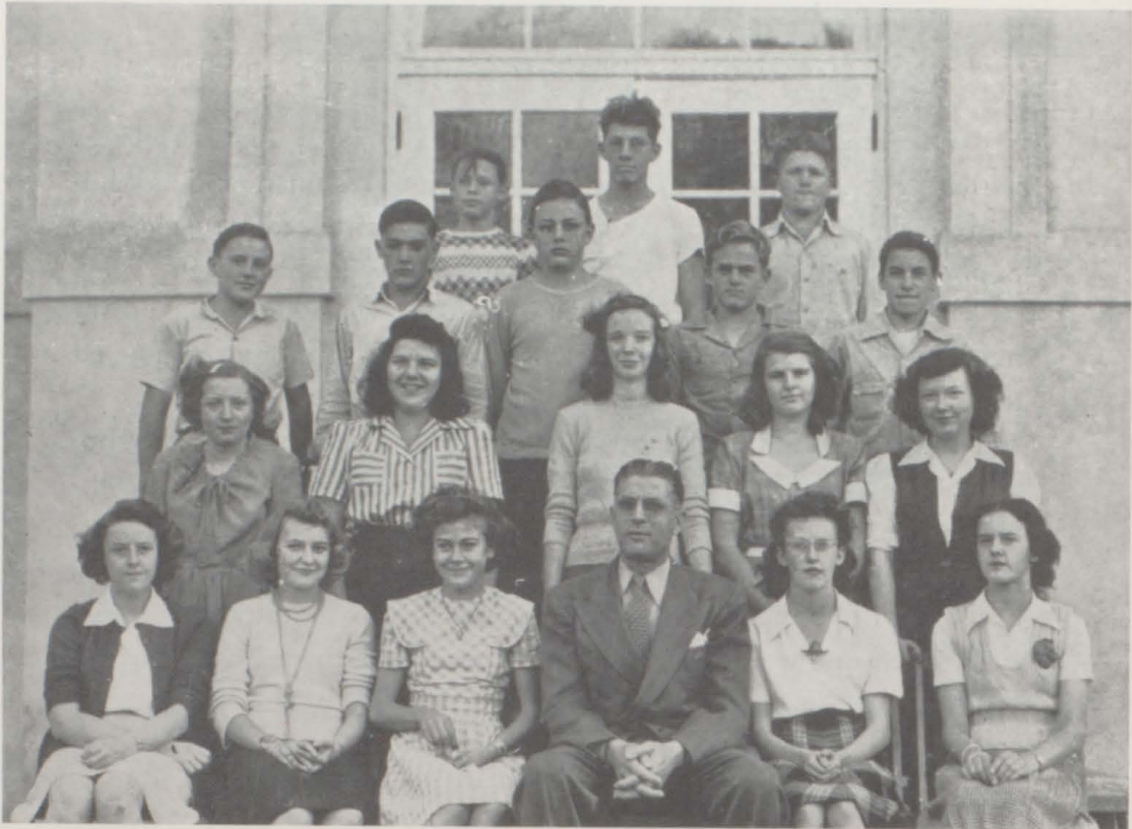
The girls' pass-ball followed. This was won by the Sophomores after a heated argument as to who was victorious.

## *National Honor Society*

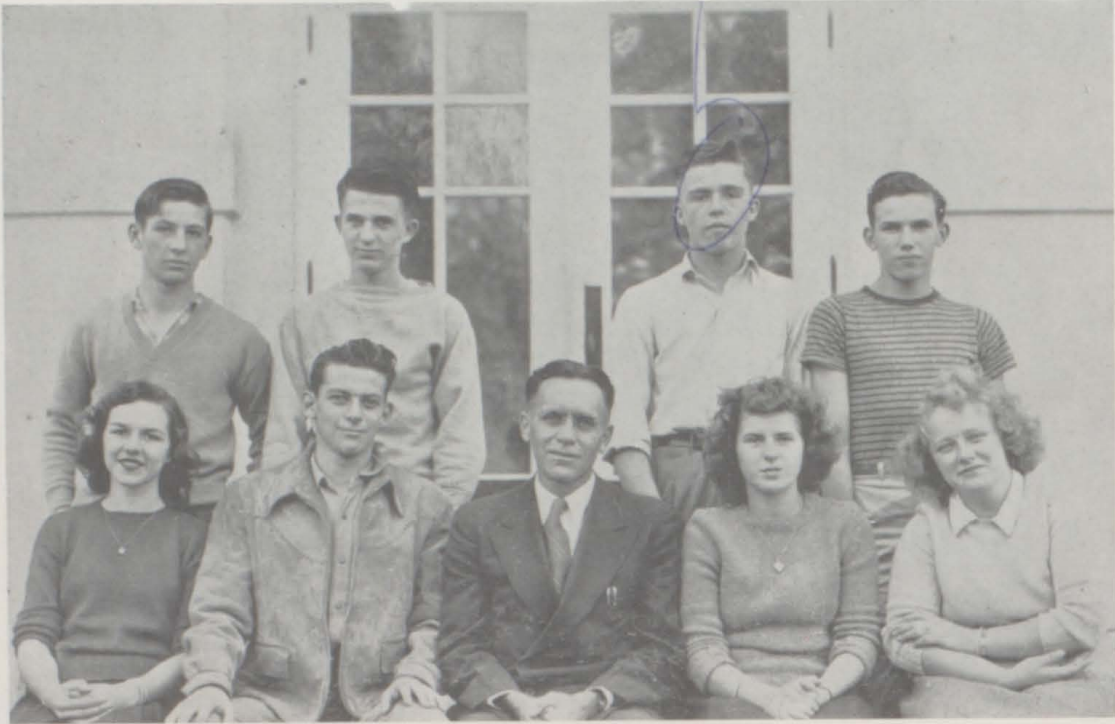


Being chosen as a member of the National Honor Society is highest honor that can be bestowed upon a senior. The students work diligently throughout their four years of high school to obtain this recognition.

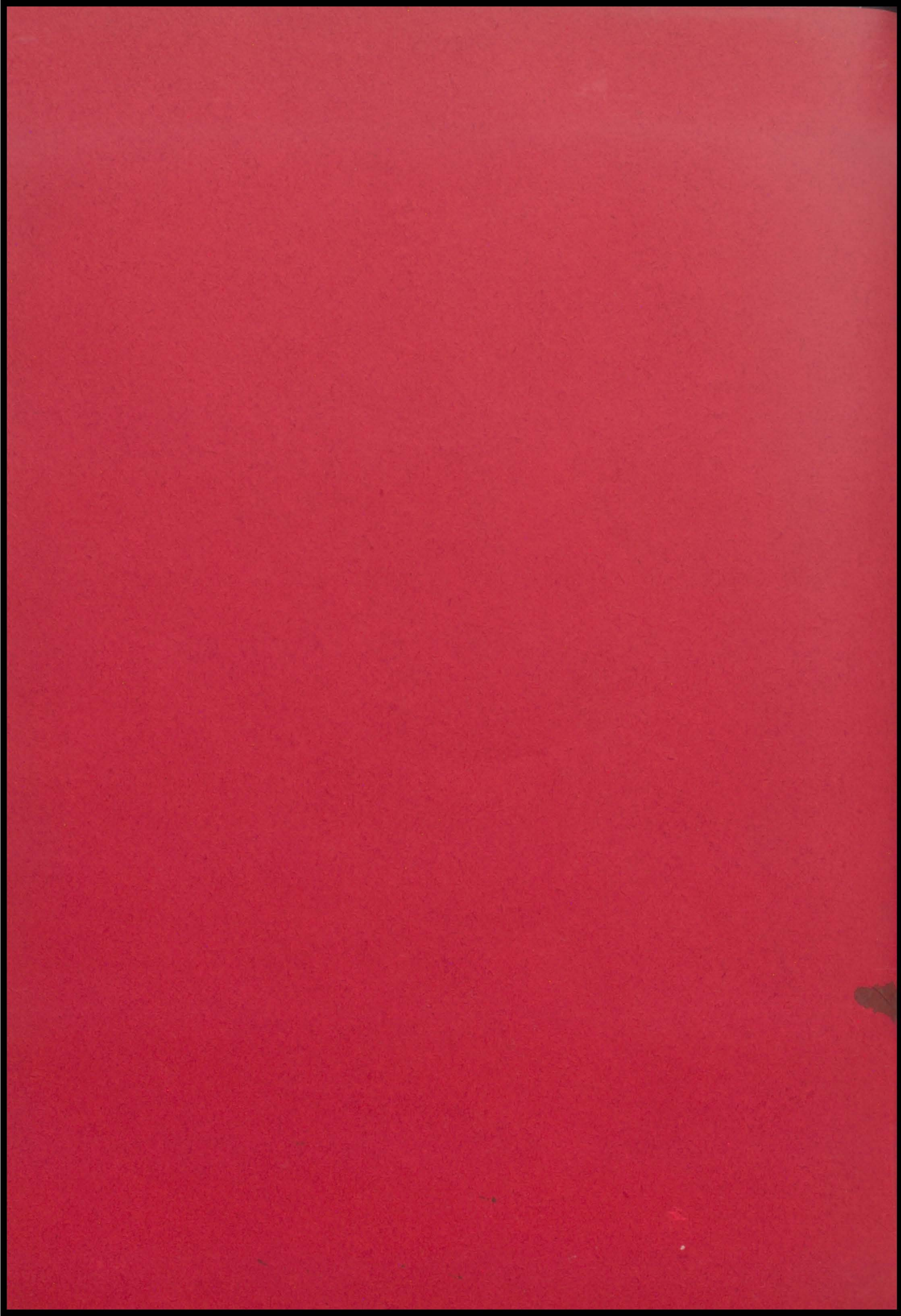
## *Band Assembly*

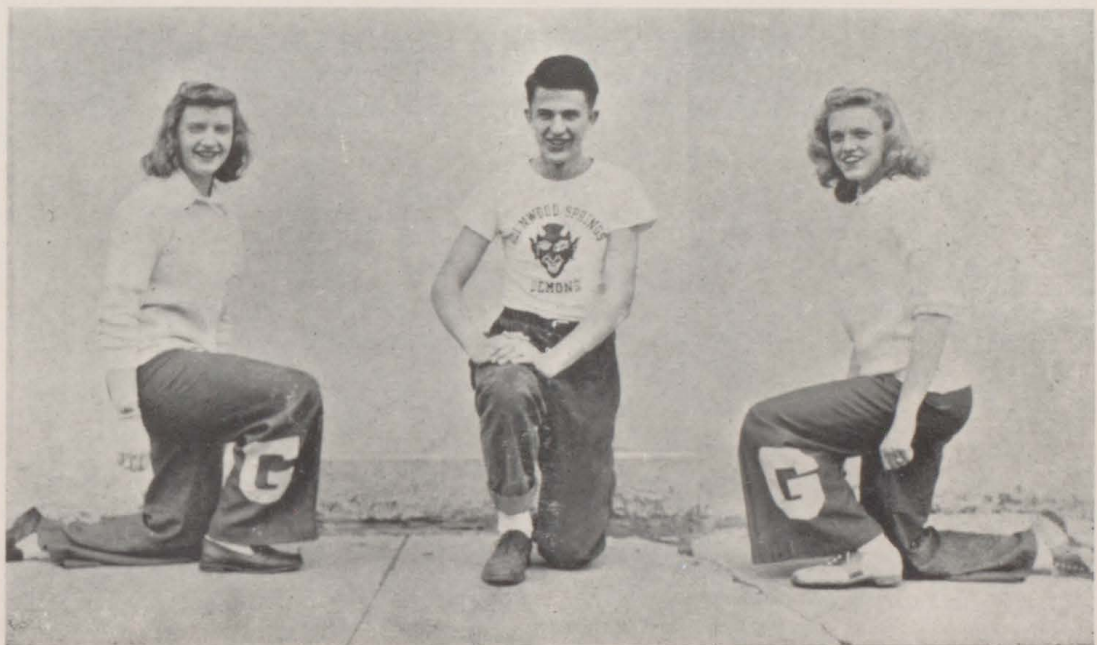

## *Football Recapitulation*

In an impromptu practice tilt with the chunky Carbondale Bulldogs, a wary Demon eleven sought out their weak points the Friday prior to their initial conference tangle. The competition proved keen but even the class C Western Slope runners-up proved no match for the inspired Demons, who defeated them 12—0.

The Hayden Tigers, the first team to be entertained on a recently sodded field, were shown sufficient respect by the Glenwood boys, due to their fine reputation of consistently having high class teams, but the dubious Demons found their fears baseless as they effortlessly romped to a conclusive 31—0 decision over the only pigskin assemblage they met in 1945 which didn't outweigh them. The victory was truly sweet revenge for the 26-0 drubbing the locals received in the Tiger lair the former year.

A trifle incredulous at their apparent ability, the Demons invited a ponderous Hotchkiss team to a rendezvous on the Glenwood gridiron in what proved to be a very interesting practice tilt. Cold water was dashed on the Demons' scoring aspirations when at half-time they found themselves on the short end of a 7—0 score. However, the grueling pace set by the Glenwood teamsters began to tell on the Bulldogs, and Sininger and Sullivan crossed the goal twice for the scores which made the 14—7 final count. The Red and White pride was justifiable in beating a team of such caliber as these Western Slope title contenders.

When the brawny Craig team played host to their comparatively dwarf-like Demon competitors, they decidedly got more than they bargained for and barring circumstances, even more than they could handle. Denied their habitual goal-crossing due to the fiery and successful efforts of the Red Devils' line, the Craig beef-boosters took to the air, and as the opening half (47 minutes long, because of erroneous time-keeping) drew to a conclusion, the desperate oil-drillers succeeded in penetrating the visitors' aerial defense for their sole tally. The gods decreed this to be Craig's lucky day as the fatal conversion registered. Aware of an ability to pull from behind such 7—0 disadvantages, the infuriated Demons struck back viciously as the third quarter commenced, and the Bulldogs soon found themselves backed up against the cross-bars. The realization that the league championship was slipping through their fingers starved the Blue and White line for a touchdown stand, and they gained the ball on downs. The kicker dropped back to alleviate his team's impending disaster; but as quickly as he received the ball, he also received a Demon lineman in the midriff, and the ball shot into the waiting hands of quarterback Keith Zerbe, who downed it for a six point Demon score. The over-anxious Red Devils allowed the desperate Bulldogs to hurry the kicker. The conversion went wide, so deciding the Demon status on the league roster. Unaware of their fate, however, the Demons threw their smoothly functioning pigskin-toters into high, again marching to the 10-yard stripe when tenacious Bulldogs rallied to destroy the hope of scoring. The ensuing kick which settled in the vicinity of the 50 yard line proved successful only as a delaying measure, for once again the undaunted Demons began to press back down the field only to be provokingly halted within a few yards of the championship by the final whistle in a game that future alumni from the 1945 squad will underline as one to remember.

The Meeker Cowpokes ventured to Glenwood with blood in their eyes and revenge in their hearts for the 6—0 supremacy the Demons had gleaned from them in 1944, but contrary to expectations, turned in a clean, well-fought game. Though the first half was close, the onlookers were neither surprised nor worried to find the Demons on the short end of a 7—0 reckoning, due to a spectacular pass interception and a 60-yard pay-dirt gallop by the visiting team in the second quarter. The superi-

The superior condition and ability of the locals began to show itself; the Demons' "Tom Harmon", left half Rollin Sininger, evened the score. From then on the Cowboys found themselves on the downgrade; screened by superb blocking, Sophomore Sininger twice more scored to lead his team to a 19—7 victory.

A traditionally tough battle at Rifle found an over-confident Demon aggregation monotonously behind 6—2 at mid-contest, the result of a sustained touch-down jaunt on the part of the Bears and a safety tallied by the locals. Faulty officiating twice had deprived the Trident-toters of touchdowns, and they entered stanza three lacking their usual enthusiasm. Their depression became apparent when the game lapsed into period four, and the scoreboard indicated 13—2, advantage of the Bears. At this point, however, a spurt of Demon spunk began to show itself, and before many minutes, at the conclusion of an uninterrupted 70 yard touchdown march climaxed by a Zerbe quarterback sneak, the tally dangled 13—9. Stalling proved to be the strategy of Rifle, and the precious minutes began to trickle by. An unseen possibility amazed the fans as fleet Chucky Van Over scooped up an ill-placed Bruin kick and twisted and squirmed 50 arduous yards for the decisive score, with but one minute remaining to be played. The 15—13 victors were given a traditional Rifle send-off amid taunts, jeers, and flying missiles.

A week of relaxation prefaced the meeting of the Yampah Valley runners-up with the Oak Creek cellar dwellers, who met utter devastation at the hands of the Demon second string, who held the spotlight most of the time. The 33—0 score was made through the combined efforts of Huber, who scored twice, Sininger, Getts and Donegan. The sportsmanship of the Miners was highly commended by spectators and players alike.

Living up to their name as Sailors, the Steamboat Swabbies provided a virtual ocean for the location of the contest with their Glenwood visitors. Despite adverse conditions, the Demons managed to cinch second place berth in the conference by winning this game 20—0. Early in the first period the Glenwoodites rolled within scoring territory from where fullback Lewis Sullivan splashed the remaining 30 yards to settle the first period score at 7—0, as the point was verified by a pass. The second quarter necessitated a defensive battle on the part of the boys in mud-spattered Red and White, as the Tars were on the prowl. The half ended with the Demons on top for a change with the score 7—0. Late in the third quarter Sullivan repeated his earlier performance and plowed 60 yards to scoring territory from where he bulled his way to pay dirt. Zerbe's kick was perfect, and the score stood 14—0. A fourth period touchdown drive ending with a precarious pass from Zerbe to Weaver ended the Demon scoring, and the game concluded a decisive 20—0 victory for the Demons.

Dame Football, after presenting the Demons with an extremely adverse practice week, smiled brightly on Coach Igo and his 1945 football charges on the day of the classic Armistice Day clash against the Rifle Bears and handed to Glenwood a 7—0 victory. Illness had beleaguered the Demons and put seven first string men to bed. A shaky varsity started the game in which Lewis Sullivan made the single tally in the first quarter of the game with a spectacular 80-yard gallop displaying all-conference caliber in his splendid open-field stepping. He was bolstered by perfectly clicking interference. The point was good on a Zerbe-Weaver pass, and the remainder of the game found the Demons in a desperate defensive stand; they were aided by numerous Rifle fumbles to emerge victors by a 7—0 score.

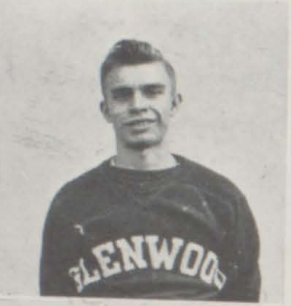

The amiable understanding with which he molded the team inspired his charges to succeed. Any praise which might be given the 1945 squad can be attributed to the faithful shepherding of Coach Igo.



DEVON SCHRODER — Manager, whose tranquil patience qualified him for the duties of team manager, capably filled that praiseless but responsible position. The members of the team appreciated his reliability and willingness, and Coach Igo was grateful for his assistance.

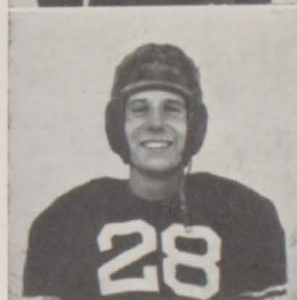

CHARLES VANOVER — This small but powerful supplement to the Demon T augmented the power of the line as center on offensive plays. As a defensive safety he was fast and deceptive. Chuck's grid season performance merited him a center position on the first all-conference team of the Yampa Valley League.



JIM WEAVER — Lanky junior, demonstrated all the tricks of football at end post and was awarded a berth on the second all-conference team. His alertness and keen perception made him one of the most valuable defensive players on the line-up. Adept in the arts of pass-catching and down field blocking, Jim helped add up many precious yards.



KEITH ZERBE — This versatile quarterback filled a key position on a T-formation team and was outstanding in performance. His sensational bone-crushing tackles plus his cool-headed ball handling procured for him a berth on the second all-conference team.



## *Basketball Recapitulation*

Faced with an exceptionally tough problem, Coach Pudlak accepted the task of molding a group of inexperienced basketball aspirants into a smoothly functioning cage contrivance.

The initial contest of the Demon schedule was a practice game against the still intact 1945 League Champions from Carbondale, held in the Bulldogs' lair; the game was a triumph for them, 19 — 16.

Dec. 14, the Colorado River Valley League play commenced with the yet inexperienced Red Devils playing hosts to their chief 1945 rivals from Palisade. The game proved to be entirely the Bulldogs', as the impotent Demons dropped this important contest by a humiliating 27 — 16 count.

The locals buckled down determinedly during the holidays with hopes of upsetting the highly vaunted Grand Junction Tigers; but the height and experienced ball-handling of the Bengals was too much for a decidedly improved Demon aggregation, who bowed to their conquerors 43 — 19. Sullivan led the Demon scorers with six points.

The first victims to accept defeat from the Glenwoodites were the Skiers from Aspen, who in a fast practice game were overpowered 24 — 18. Sullivan and Vaughan led their teammates in overcoming a 9 — 4 half-time deficit and topped scorers with 11, 8 points respectively.

With high hopes the locals went to Fruitvale, only to meet bitter disappointment at the hands of the perennially good Vikings, who trounced them 31 — 11. Zerbe was Demon high scorer.

Such abasement made the Demon blood boil, and the Fruita five received a thorough drubbing to the sweet melody of 53 — 35. Though the score was a 14 — 14 deadlock at the end of the first quarter, the game was all Glenwood's with Huber's 22 points leading all scorers. Weaver, Sullivan and Vaughan garnered 12, 8, and 8 points respectively.

The following evening a tenacious Eagle five was edged out by a 35 — 33 tally in a practice game on the Cowboys' floor; Weaver was high scoring Demon with 8 points.

A materially rich but experience-poor town team bowed in defeat to the locals in a hair-raising practice tilt, 40 — 30, with Huber dropping 11 points to lead all scorers.

When the Red and White cage pentagon played host to their traditional Rifle rivals, they were sufficiently respectful of their opponents' height to get in the first punch with a 14 — 14 first quarter advantage which carried them through a tough contest ending 33 — 27 in their favor. The big gun was Bill Huber with 14 points.

Because their style was cramped by unusual conditions of their opponents' court, the visiting Demons failed to duck enough pipes or to maintain suitable footing in the dance-hall gymnasium at Aspen, and they were hairlined in a 26 — 24 defeat.

The setback in the Aspen practice game served to intensify the fire in the Demon heart as was shown the Palisade Bulldogs when they played host to a thoroughly renovated Red and White squad; the Demons overshadowed Palisade 27 — 21, showing an 18 point improvement over their previous engagement. Huber once again crowned himself King scorer with 12 points. The highlight of the evening was a second string thriller in which fancy-shooting Al Toth, single-

handed, transformed a virtual Demon defeat into a last minute triumph by shelving 11 badly needed points in the last minutes to subdue the Bulldogs 33 — 31 and to credit himself with scoring honors.

The soaring Demon aspirations riding a jubilant triple triumph were abruptly shattered by the highly-reputed Grand Junction Bengals destined to squelch all opposition and complete an undefeated season as Class B State Champions. The game was a complete rout as the Bengals sizzled the nets for 84 points as compared to the valiant 34 of the Demons.

Second only to Grand Junction, the State runner-up from Fruitvale had no easy task in quelling a determined Demon effort on the locals' floor; the game ended 32 — 27.

A return practice game with Eagle proved to be a high-scoring thriller favoring the Demons with a one point victory. The Red Devils were on the ropes in this game, having had their 6 point half-time lead whittled to a final 45—46 mainly by a hot streak of the classy cowboy forward, Lynn Randall. Vaughan bore the brunt of the scoring with 18 points.

A journey to Fruita resulted in the locals' walking away with a 44 — 22 win. Weaver, with 14 points to his credit, was the fair haired lad of this engagement.

In a second practice tilt with Carbondale, the Trident Toters managed to eke out a 33 — 31 triumph; this game was the final priming for the all-important contest with the ever-improving Rifle Bears. With a berth at the Delta Tourney as stakes, the Bruins effortlessly ran up a 10 — 3 first quarter advantage. Being half-time underdogs to Rifle was no novelty to the Demons, who failed to despair and in true Demonic spirit fought to a 30 — 30 deadlock in the final minutes of the concluding quarter. Thanks to a deadly accurate long shot of Bigum, the Red and White efforts were repaid with a 33 — 30 superiority until the Bruins caught fire and tipped the odds to their favor 35 — 34. As the minutes dwindled the Demon cause seemed lost until a keyed-up Rifle player inflicted a disastrous foul on Weaver, who tied the score 35 all. An overtime period seemed inevitable when another Bruin fouled Sullivan, who with great calmness assured himself and his fellow seniors of a graduation free from a Rifle defeat by sinking an all-important free throw. The final decision, 36 — 35, assured the Demons of a trip to Delta.

In tournament play the Delta Panthers, short only two men from their championship squad of the previous year, went entirely wild before their hometown crowd to send the Demons limping into the Consolation bracket, the victims of a 51 — 22 pummeling.

Thoroughly disheartened, the Glenwoodites engaged the Sailors from Steamboat in the consolation bracket; and in a sluggish game on their part, the Red Devils dropped a close one to a team no better than they, 41 — 37, to be eliminated.

Nevertheless, the Demons felt they had concluded a good season with eleven wins and eight losses through the over-all season play, exclusive of tournament games. Their coach, John Pudlik, deserves commendation for the job he did in pulling his charges through extremely stiff competition with such a record.

It is with pride that we present our Senior Stars of the year 1945 — 46.



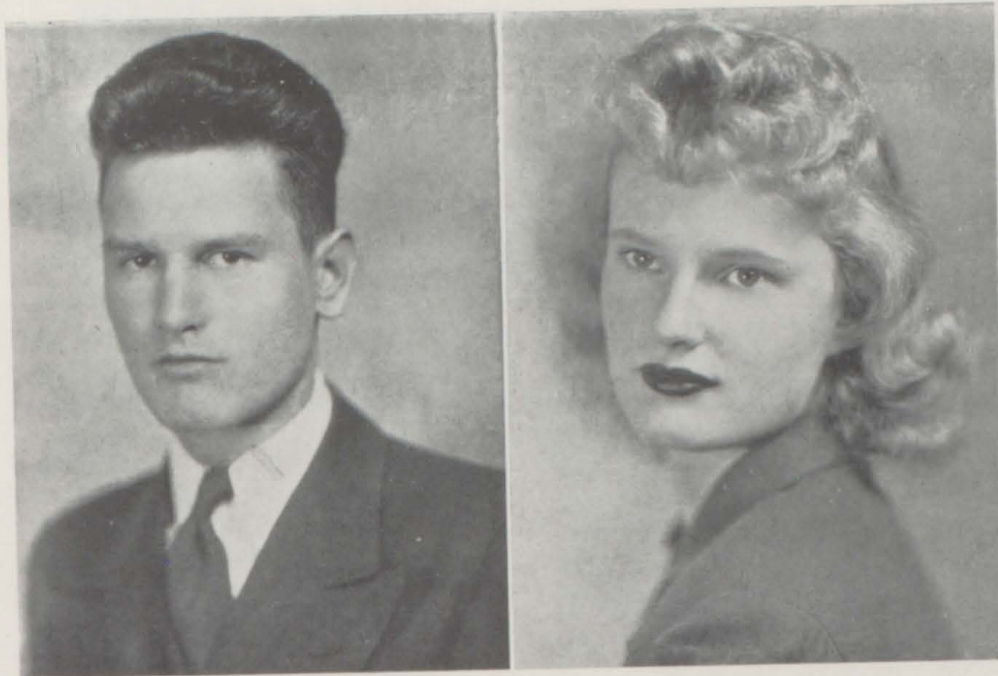
### *Bill Huber*

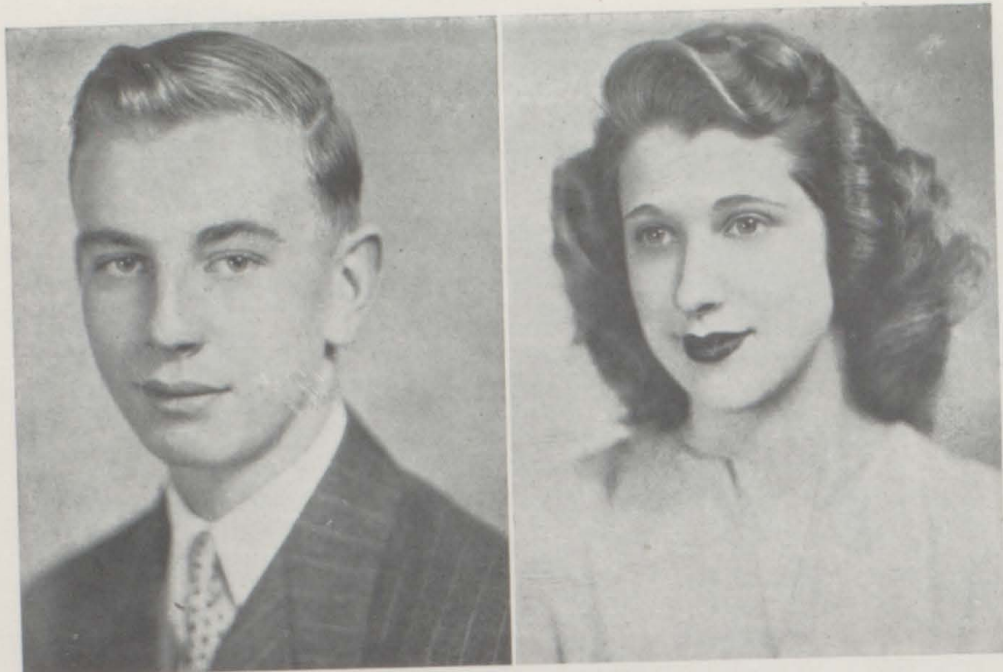


### *Fred Pearce*

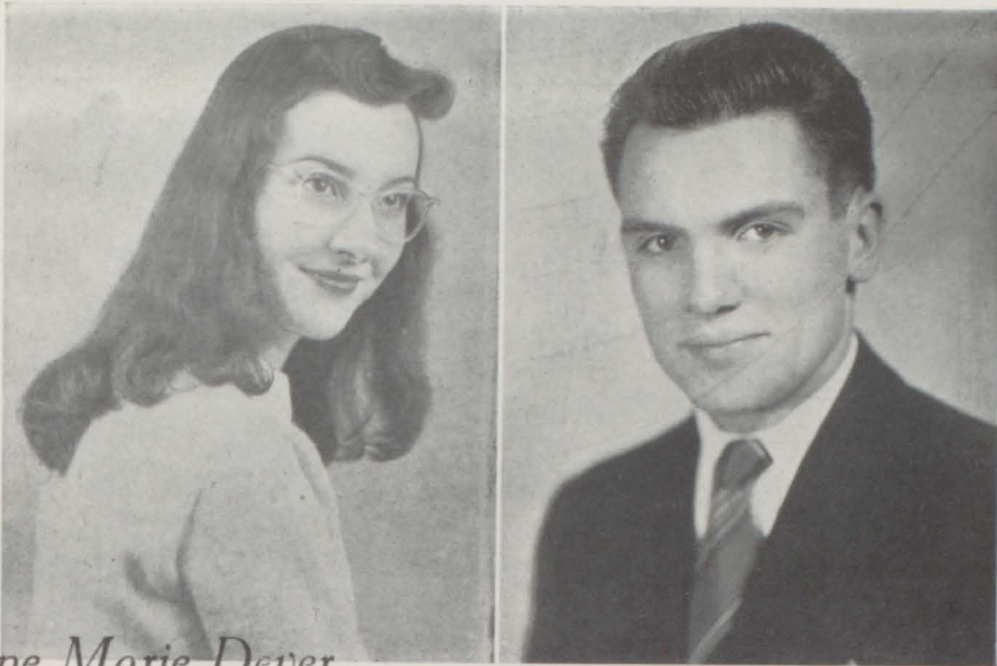


### *John Shultz*

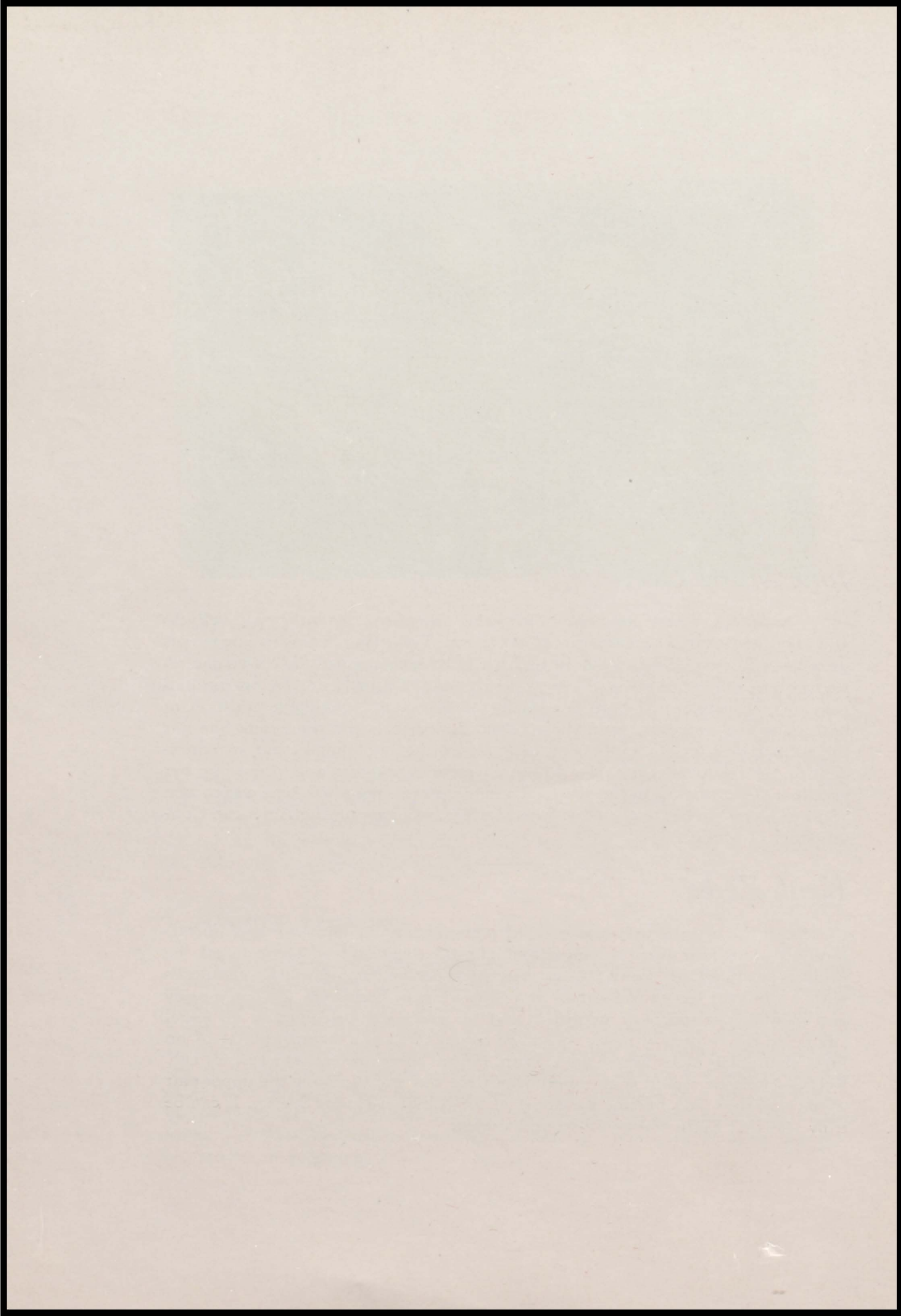


*Jane Marie Dever*

### *Keith Zerbe*

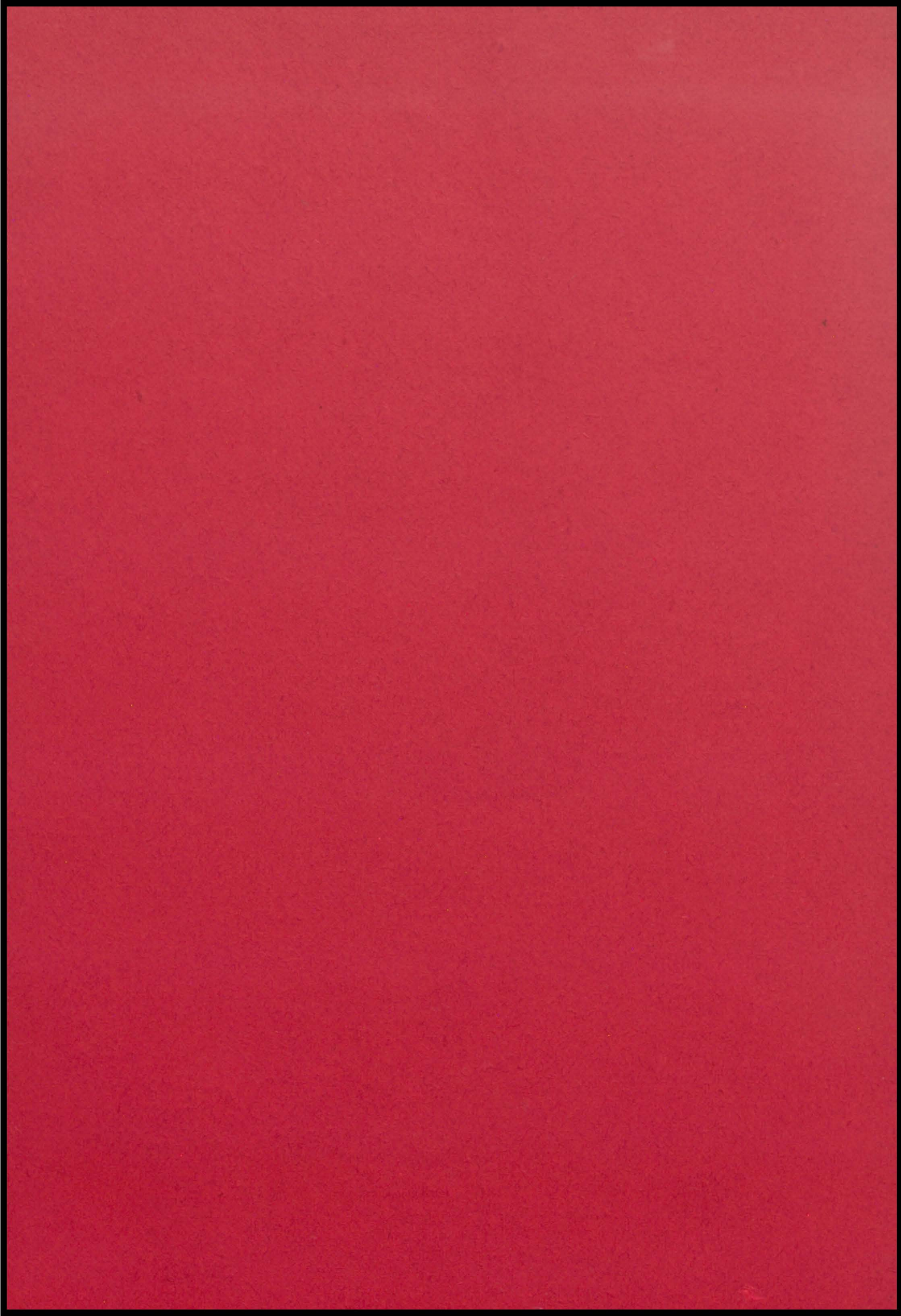
