September 4. 1945, was an exciting day for thirty-seven hopeful freshmen. Highlighting the initiation ceremony was the fashion show given by fifreen boys in feminine attire. The day was topped off by the bitterly contested FroshSophomore struggle, in which the frosh were beaten 12 to 9 .

The freshmen were soon taking part in many high school activities. Eleven were enrolled in band; Ernest Donegan and Mircus Nordberg represented the class in athletics.Even though the class took part in many activities, they found time for studies and made an excellent scholastic record.

Uncer the directicn of Mrs. Almgren, the freshmen successfuily presented the annual Christmas program.

Officers for the year were Larry Drake, president; Harvey Bellm, vice-president; Kay Wilson, secretary; Joyce Barz, treasurer; Louise Haltord, Student Council treasurer; Annette Heuberger, Studınt Council rt presentative.

Twenty-six of the original class plus four new students enrolled for the sophemore year. Officers elected were Jack Fitzgerald, president; Harry Shetlar, vicepresident; Freda Hansen, secretary; Rebert Todd, treasurer. Don Vanderhoof was Student Council secretary and Joyce Barz, Council representative. $M_{\text {iss }}$ Margaret Egan was class sponsor.

Scholastically, the sophomores still rated high. The class was always well represented on the honor roll, and several participated in the scholastic contests. Four sophomores took part in athletics. Two of these, Marcus Nordberg and Ernest Donegan, earned letters.

The junior year proved very active and successful. The class participated in every phase of school activities and enjoyed immensely their status as upper classmen. Officers for this year were Edward Gibbs, president; Twylla Read, vicepresident; Marcus Nordberg, secretary; Jack Fitzgerald, treasurer. loyce Barz and Joyce Johnson served on the Student Council.

On April 9 the class presented a three-act comedy entitled "Moonlight For Herbert." Through the cooperation of the entire class and Mrs. Ann Guth, the the play was a complete success. The annual Junior-Senior prom was presented on May 14. The theme of the prom was the Mardi Gras. Helen Noblitt was elected prom queen and Don Vanderhoof prom king. The auditorium was elaborately decorated, with simulated houses, streamers and balloons providing a carnival atmosphere. On the day following the prom, the Junior-Senior luncheon was held. The class picnic at Ashcroft climaxed the year.

In the senior year, even greater achievements were attained. The number of :eniors on the honor roll exceeded that of all other classes. In athletics, eight seniors lettered, three in both basketball and football. Nine of the class were in band; several participated in the music contest and won excellent ratings.

On December 10, under the very able direction of Mis. Rilla Rader, the seniors presented their class play, "One Mad Night" The play, a farce in three acts, was given before a capacity audience. Later in Lecember, the "Forty-niners" sponsored the Christmas Formal.
Officers for this final year were Don Vanderhoof, president; Annette Heuberger, vice-president; Joyce Johnson, secretary; Twylla Read, treasurer. Marcus Nordberg was Student Council president and Joyce Barz, Senior representative.

Coach Stubler's charges enjoyed a fairly successful season during 1948, winning five and losing four games in a very tough schedule. Injuries plagued the Demons throughout the season.

The first game of the season was a non-league tilt with the "B" squad from Grand Junction. The local gridders won this scrap easily and gained valuable experience. Don Vanderhoof, quarterback of the Red-and-White eleven, scored three T. D.'s for indivioual honors in the 24.0 rout.

The Demons travelled to Meeker to engaged the Cowboys in a non-conference game and came out victorious, 27-13. The Meeker passing attack confused the visitors during the first half as the Cowboys corneted two quick touchdowns through the air. In the second half, Henry Coll's quick-opening off-tackle slants spelled defeat for the fighting gridders from Meeker.
The third game of the season was a tragic one for the Demons. Alamosa's Maroons, considerably out of Glenwood's class, soundly spanked their visitors 41 0 A trio of swift and hefty backs, Hurly, Starbuck, and Salazar, ran circles around and through the befuddled Demons. Vanderhoof, Red and White quarterback, was injured early in the first period, a demoralizing blow to the usually high Demon spirits. "Bud" Donegan's terrific defensive play and Bill Colohan's passing helped to keep down the rampaging spud-pickers from the San Luis Valley.
The first conference game of the year put another victory on the Demon slate. Central's Warriors fell 12-0 before a slow but well-oiled Glenwood grid machine. Jack Fitzgerald, classy Demon half, was the outstanding player in this game.

A big fast team trom the Eastern Slope, Westminster's Warriors, were the next victims of the now clicking Demon eleven. The visitors showed a powerful offense and a strong but somewhat temperamental defense. Henry Coll scored the only touchdown of the day as the Demons triumphed 6-0.

Another conference victory was notched in the Demon pitch-fork as they journeyed to Fruita to trim the Wildcats $25-0$. This game was all Colohan for the Glenwood crew. Bountiful Bill ran for three touchdowns and pitched a long aerial to Simillion for the fourth. Jump and Donegan led the Demon defense.
Injuries and a rusty defense lost the conference championship for the Demons as Rifle's Bears capitalized on two long runs to defeat their hosts 13-0. Mikkelson, speedy Bear half, spelled the difference between the teams as he ran for two touchdowns on runs of 40 and 60 yards.

Fitzgerald was the big wheel for the Demons on offensive with Lewis, Call, and Rowe sharing defensive honors.
A wild, free-scoring game with Hotchkiss put another dent in the Demon record The visiting Bulldogs eked out a hectic 31-26 victory. The center of the Demon line collapsed in the last half as the Bulldogs rolled again and again right down the middle. A Demon lead of 19-6 quickly fell apart as the visitors showed power and a will to win during a third quarter spree for 19 points.
The final game of the season was a fitting climax to an exciting season. Craig, Yampah Valley Champs, narrowly defeated the Demons 13-7. The home-town boys took a lead of 7 points in the first half,but the Bulldogs roared back for 2 touchdowns in the last half to gain a well-earned victory.

Fruita: In their first encounter with Fruita the Demons swamped the Wildcats 46-27. Unable to find the range in the first two periods, the Demnnsled only 18-15 at the half. The Glenwood Demons however. came back very strong, pouring in 27 points in the last two quarters and holding the Wildcats to 12 points. Colohan and Simillion shared high point honors with 11 points apiece.

The Demons conıpletely routed the Wildcats in their second game 70-16, scoring almost at will azainst the hapless Wildcats.
At the end of the first quarter, the Glenwood boys led $16-1$; from there on it was a question of how mary points the Demens would rack up. Coach Stubler let the alternates finish the game. Nordberg's 22 points were high for the night.

Rifle: The Red and White tromped over the visiting Bears $53-30$ in their first e icounter. Colohan paced the Demons to their victory with a 19 pointoutput. The Demons led all the way and were never threatened by Rifle's ineffective offense.
In the second game with Rifle, a very cold Glenwood team lost to the Bears in Rifle in an overtime period 4342 . The Demons failed to hit a large percentage of their shots but still managed to keep a slim lead until the fourth quarter when the Bears put through fifteen points. A mixup made the clock go off with still fifteen secends left, Rifle leading 34-32. The players who had left the floor were called back to finish the game. Simillion's hit for two points threw the game into an overtime period in which the Demon were outscored 9-8. Colohan was high for the Demons with 16 points.

Central: A strong Central team was edged out $37-35$ in their first encc unter with the Red and White in Glenwood. The Warriors led 31-25 going into the fourth stanza, but the Demons rallied and poured in 12 points, holding the Warriors to 4. A great help to the Glenwood victory was the fouling out of Harvey Elrod, Central's classy forward. Colohan again topped the scorers, this time with 13 points.

In the second encounter, a tired but fighting Glenwood team lost the Colorado A Valley League Championship to Central 26-19. In the game played on the Warriors' floor, the Demons failed to muster a semblance of a scoring threat, even though they outscored the Warriors 11-16 in the first two periods. Harvey Elrod took charge of Central's offense in the last two periods and swished through 18 points for Central's victory. Colohan led the Red and White with 6 points.

An eight point output in this period gave the Demons their slim margin of victory.
"Oscar" Nordberg and "Buzz" Simillion showed high point honors for the Demons, both netting 6 points

In the championship contest the Demons nosed out the Central Warriors 2625. The Demons led most of the way through the first three quarters, however.
