COLLEGE PREPARATORY COURSE
First Year Subjects required: English I and Algebra I.
Electives: Latin I, Spanish I, Social Science, General Science.
Secund Year Subjects required: English II, Plane Geometry, World History. Electives: Latin I I, Spanish II, Biology.
Third Year Subjects required: English III and American History.
Electives: Chemistry, Advanced Algebra, Solid Geometry, and Trigonometry.
Fourth Year Subjects required: Sociology.
Electives: English IV, Physics, Chemistry, Advanced Algebra, Solid Geometry, and Trigonometry.

## COMMERCIAL

The studies in the commercial department are for the purpose of preparing the students directly for the business world and not for college. Many students secure positions directly after leaving school as a result of this department.

Courses offered are Typing I and I I, Shorthand I and II, and Bookkeeping Business English is available.

## GENERAL COURSE

This course is a combination of the college preparatory and the commercial courses. Juniers and Seniors who choose this course may elect commercial studies such as typing and shorthand.

## CLUBS

In an effort to widen thecurriculum for each student, a number of clubs are offered. These clubs meet once a week during school tine and are under the sponsorship of one of the teachers.

The Hayden Tigers had morethan the Demons expected, for by halftime, they had outplayed them both on the ground and in the air $H$ owever, in the last half, the Demons rook a com nanding lead bv scoring nine 0 oints in the third quarter and holding the Tigers wirhout a point. It was Hayden's big line that finally drove the Demons back to the goal line and gave them the scoring opportunity. Their only score came by a short delayed pass over center. Score: 9-6.
Palisade
The Demons engaged the Palisade Rulldogs in the first game of the '50 season to be played on Glenwood's home field. While the whole team displayed a well co-ordinated offense, the Demon's forward wall stopped nearly every running play the Bulldogs could launch. A desisive $42-12$ victory resulted from the teamwork as tl e Red and White began to show the qualities of a championship team. Fruira

Again the Demons got off to a slow start, but recovered and soundly trounced the Wildcats 33.6 in an unorthodox manner Fruita scored first but were not able to bring the ball across the fifty yard line thereafter. Norman Ross stole the show when he snagged a pass on his four yard line and ran nınety-six yards un,touched for a score. This was the first conference game for the Demons.

## Rifle

This was the big game as far as the Red Uevils were concerned, since Glenwood and Rifle were the strongest contenders for the championship. The scotes of pre, vious games indicared that the tuo te:ms were fairly evonly mathed. Rifle diew hoed when Ammerman picked up a loose hall and went all the way tor a rally. The Demons managed to score, but the try for extra point failed, the score standing 7.6 all through the third quarter. Just as things began to look doubrful for Glenwood, the Demons' determination began to show itself. The Red and White drove for a second score early in the fourth quarter and then again in the same period to cinch the outcome. The final score, 19-7, was indeed a joyous outcome for the annual "big game."
Craig
The Craig game proved to be one of the easiest of the season for Glenwood as they ran roughshod over the Bulldogs 39-5. Everyone in the backfield scored at least once; one end carried the ball over the goal line on a long pass. Lynn Fey continually punched holes through the G.enwood defense but did not have ennough help to score until late in the last quarter. With three conference wins, the Demons had only the Central Warriors between them and the conference title.

## Central

This was the only game that stood between the Dear ens and the conference championship, and the Glenwood gridmen had determined ideas' concerning the outcome. Ten of the starting eleven seniors who would be playing theii last conference football game for Glenwood, and the 45-13 score indicated the fury with which the Demons attacked their foe. This game ran the Demons' winning streak to six in succession, and also distinguished the Red and White as the top team in the Colorado Valley A Conference.
Oak Creek

This game gave the home team fans a chance to see how the Red and White would stack up against the Gunnison Valley Champions, whe turned out to be the Montrose Indians.

## Montrose

Although the Indians decisively beat Glenwood by a lopsided score of 32-0, the game was not so one-sided as the score indicates. Glenwood outdistanced the Indians on the ground, but it was yardgaining passes that decided the championship. However, pass defense could not stop the unexpected air attack. Montrose beat Lakewood 20-7 for the State Championship

The firsteleven on the team of '51 consisted of players with previous varsity or "B" squad experience, wich the exception of Marx and Simillion. The others were J. Nuttirg. Dave Brown, Reid Graves, Norman Ross Jamie Baker, Don Patch, Bill Bol tho, Don Allan, and Bill Colohan.
CARBONDALE-The Denoons took unfair advantage of the Carbondale Bulldogs by crushing them 57-2u in Crlenwool's Invitational Tcurnament. In the game determining the tournament champions, the Glenwood cagers dumped the stubborn New Castle five 39-36. Harris of New Castle was the fair-haired boy who kept the game as close as it was.
GRAND iUNCTION The next week the overconfident Red Devils were trounced by a green but determuned Junction team. The Demons were rinable to show any evidence of their reputed ability and even lacked the indispensable hustle. The f nal score-Grand Junction, 41-Glenwood 24.
PAONIA.The next night was the same story Paonia took a quick lead at the starting whistle and never relitiquished it. The Demons were defeated 38-28
PALISADE-However, the next werk the Red and White were consoled by downing the Palisade cagers in a one-sided affair. The game was rough, two players being expelled from the game. The Demons gloated over their 40-21 victory
LEADVILLE-Glenwood traveled to Leadville the next week to beat the seven Leadville players 42 31. The Demons sneaked away from Leadville safely, but piled all three of their cars up before getting off Battle Mountzin.
FRUITA-The first conference game seemed to be one of the easiest of the season for the conquering Demons. The Fruita Wildcats were bewildered by their fast scoring attack and were trounced 57-30.

Had the Demons wott, they would have been tied for first with Rifle, but the Wariors upset the Red and White $36-37$, and Glenwood chose to go to Delta in third place instead of playing off the second place tie with Central.
