EUGENE TEATS, DENVER PIONEER MINER, IS DEAD

He Arrived Here as a Boy
With Wagon Train
in 1856.

Eugene H. Teats, pioneer, miner, traveler and teller of early-day tales, died Sunday at his home, 745 Lafayette street. He was 82 years old.

Eugene Teats, as a 9-year-old boy, arrived in Denver with a wagon train, and joined his father, Robert H. Teats, proprietor of the old Elephant corral, Fifteenth and Blake

streets. That was in 1856. He came west from Mt. Clemens, Mich., where he was born, May 2, 1857.

As Eugene Teats became older, he acquired interest in mines throught the state. He was married in Georgetown, Colo. His wife, Mrs. Alice A. Teats, died here, Dec. 30, 1928.

OFTEN TRAVELED TO SOUTH AMERICA.

For many years Mr. Teats held extensive interests in a gold mining company in Dutch Guiana, and traveled between Denver and South America, sometimes making two trips a year. He gave up this interest several years ago, because of ill health.

The old Elephant corral, in the wagon train days, was the starting point and the goal of the bull whackers and mule skinnners, and the assembly place of cowboys, miners, gamblers, gunmen, Indians and adventurers. Young Teats learned to know them all. He loved to tell stories of his boyhood here—stories that were vivid word pictures drawn from youthful memories of an almost camera-like clarity.

Eugene Teats saw Con Oram and Enoch Davis fight their 114-round prizefight here. His father was a second in the first formal duel fought in Denver.

DUELISTS' PISTOLS LOADED WITH BLANKS.

An argument over treatment of a horse by a French restaurant keeper led to the duel between the Frenchman and Col. Ned Wynkoop. Neither duelist knew his pistol had been loaded with blanks.

Young Teats, 14 years old, rode Chief, the horse that raced Border Ruffian for the \$30,000 gold brick stakes in 1881. Never before nor since was such a race run in Colorado. The \$40,000 in the gold dust bet by backers of the two horses was pooled in an \$80,000 brick of solid gold, which hung in plain sight above the finish line. The course was on the old McNasser farm, where the Globe smelter stack now stands. Chief, with Teats up, won.

Surviving Mr. Teats are two daughters, Miss Helen Teats and Mrs. Goy Ferrall, both of Denver; a brother, Frank, of Littleton; two granddaughters, Mrs. Robert Wynkoop, Denver, and Mrs. Richard Upton, New York, and a great grandson, Richard Upton Jr., of New York.

The funeral will be from the Olliger mortuary Wednesday at 11:30 a. m., followed by cremation at Riverside cemetery.
