Barth gives instructions on trip to California in Ford Auto: 1-7-15 My dear Mr. Davis: -- In the first place whoever wants to go, let them decide whether they want to camp on the road or stay at the hotels. You can easily drive from one town to the next and find garage and hotel accomodations. If camping is decided on, camp the first night and every night thereafter wherever the notion takes you to stop. Carry from three to four gallons of water in canvass water-bottles and never neglect an opportunity to fill the radiator or bottles .-- We carried a little wood but burned mostly sagebrush. greasewood and such stuff. Do not take a tent with poles as I did, but go to the Brooks Tent and Awning co. in Denver and get one of his automobile tents that go over the car when the top is up. It stakes down on the left side and front and leaves room on the back and right side of the car. Put a trunk rack on the rear and carry the camp stove on it. When ready to camp, put the top up, if it is not already up, put your tent over it, put your stove on the ground, put up the pipe, start a fire and you will be surprised to see how soon you will be warm and comfortable. Use the trunk rack for a table. For sleeping have the back of the front seat cut down at the sides and fixed to lower so that the back seat, the back of the front seat and the front seat are level, a good bed for two. Take pillows and covers to suit. You can buy food all along the way. Space is limited and every pound counts when you pull thru snow, mud and sand and crossing several mountain ranges. Ship everything you can it is far cheaper. Be sure to drain the radiator every night, it might be warm when you stop but freeze before morning. Carry oil and be sure to look after the engine every morning and at least once during the day. Keep the tank full of gasoline, it will cost you, from 20¢ to 30¢ a gallon. -- If possible arrange your trip so that you will not have to travel after dark. The roads are too uncertain. Take your time and see things as you go. We camped one night in the petrified forrest and also went to see the Grand Canyon of the Colorado and the Cliff Dwellers Ruins. We were a month on the way, it is none too long. Be sure and have good tires and tubes and don't forger your chains. You will need them. Also take a shovel, a small ax, and a three gallon bucket to hold the water when you drain the radiator. Be sure and do not carry anything in your machine that can get along without. The lighter the car the easier she will run. Have money in your pocket so that you can buy anything along the road, if anything goes wrong. Tires wear out quickly on the road and repairs on the car come high. In all of our trip there were always some cars with us and we never camped alone. Be careful about the roads. It is easy to get on the wrong one and get lost, and don't try to hurry. Very Truly Yours
