Mar.24 Craig Colony founded in honor of Frank Craig, born Jan. 18, 1877, died Dec. 11, 1914. Frank Craig is a descendent of General Alexander Craig, Commander in Washington's Army. Craigs schooling fitted him for a professional career. Ill health sent him to Colo. in 1907. Lack of finances compelled him to live in open tent, which he shared with fellow sufferers. The man's wonderful self denial and Christianity attracted attention and organized help was provided. The Colony of "Brotherly Love" was organized which afterward became known as Craig Colony.
