Marguarite Jones, 1933

The town installed a new night police call, looking more like a big strawberry than anything else on a light pole at Wadsworth and Grand-view. The switch to light it is at the telephone office, and persons wanting the night marshall must phone to control and have her flash on the light.

January 12

The town board discussed making the town water system more efficient with the purchase of a new turbine pump which could pump from the deep wells into the chloronating tank. It would be economical with little wear after long service.

The town has 3 artesian wells - two with good pumps. The other needs a new pump and the turbine, although more expensive, would make up for the high cost in cheaper constant and more efficient operation.

Prices run from \$1,650 to \$2,650. The town voted to purchase the

pump, and contract to purchase pump was make in March.

The Arvada Luncheon Club discussed a new proposal to bring western slope water to Jefferson County through a tunnel to be constructed under the Continental Divide. Estimated cost to be \$p,000,000. Later, they voted against it.

The Women's Relief Corp, was an active organization. They gave out American flags to different organizations and schools during the year. Also held essay and poster contests in Arvada schools.

An order by Dist. Attorney Harry Behm issued that all slot machines and punch boards and other contrivances for gambling be withdrawn from the County.

Arvada Day at Elitch's held annually. Entertainment included girls' soft-ball games and various competitive races and games, with prizes donated by Arvada business men.

New Colorado grading laws passed to help stimulate the growth of the poultry industry, proving proper grading and labelling to encourage consumption and eliminating poor eggs unfit for human consumption, helping minimize the price cutting effect of a low grade product.

Dandling and labelling to be required.

The wheat farmers in Arvada started the government plan of weat control. They would be paid 28¢ per bushel on 54% of their production during the last three years if producer would reduce the seeding of wheat for 134 and 135 crops by an amount not to exceed 20% of average seeded during those past 3 years. The farmers were to learn about the program to see if they would be able to cooperate with the government in this great undertaking.

Wadsworth Blvd was paved on the Governor's Public Works Program, \$300,000 being alloted for the project to connect Arvada with Federal Blvd at Broomfield. It is part of a 26 million dollar road building program in which the Governor is trying to do away with direct unemployment relief. This puts Arvada on the most important road (north and south) in the State.

In October, Arvada had a large float in the big N.R.A. parade in Denver. The letters N. R. A. were in green and gold flowers set off with celery (an important crop in the area) with three plows at the top shwoing that agriculture was in harmony with the blue eagle, the N.R.A. emblem.

School children wrote essays on "What the N.R.A. has done for me." Arvada business men signed pledges of the N.R.B. by which the gov. hopes to reduce unemployment.

The Jefferson County Relief Leage, a self-help organization, had a local unit in Arvada to help people trade services for food or fuel. Relief families received 27 cases of pork and beans and salt pork.

Under the Civic Works Relief Program of the U.S. Government, Arvada got a big share to employ 40 men to landscape East Grandview Parkway

Charles W. Davis, one of Arvada's oldest pioneers, died November 2, 1933. He came to Arvada in 1863 making the trip with parents by wagon and ox team. They settled on Ralston Creek northwest of Arvada.

The Arvada community had its usual Christmas tree and treat with the Fire Department taking care of treats as usual. The tree set up on the corner of Wadsworth and Grandview. Over 700 sacks were distributed.

Drivers with noisy cars were warned by night Marshall William Benson. All drivers roaring through town were advised to keep mufflers closed while in city limits.


